



Walk with L'Arche tops 500 participants

The 13th annual Olympic Building Centre's Walk with L'Arche on May 7th was a great success. The sun was shining, the sky was a beautiful blue and the wind was gentle, which made for a wonderful walking experience.

With 440 registrations and 78 volunteers, this year's walk saw our largest turnout ever. We welcomed 135 new registrants who identified themselves as "first time walking with L'Arche". All these participants who came out to support L'Arche helped raise a total of \$69,611.00 in pledges (just \$240.00 shy of making this our 2nd best Walk). One hundred per cent of pledges raised will be used to help maintain and improve the quality of life of L'Arche members with a developmental disability and their volunteer assistants.

There were 19 teams registered for the walk, and **L'Arche Tova Café** took the trophy and prize for **Top Fundraising Team**. Collectively, this 19-member team *Order Up!* raised a total of \$5,329.00.

Hazel won the **Top Individual Fundraiser** prize, having raised \$4,000.00 with the help of her friends Kathy, Roger, and Clive.

Remembering Kevin

Kevin passed away on April 5th at age 51, after spending nearly 39 years in L'Arche Winnipeg. Kevin came to L'Arche on August 8, 1978 when he was just 13 years old.

Family members, friends, L'Arche members and many past assistants have shared fond memories of knowing and living with Kevin. The following three reflections are excerpts from tributes given by L'Arche members at Kevin's funeral service.

Not only was Kevin a friend of ours, he was also our teacher. Kevin was not interested in what most of us dedicate too much time to: work, success, money, (except he did need enough money for Coke, McDonald's and Subway!). For Kevin life was all about relationships, making people laugh and having fun. Kevin was very intuitive and could tell when someone needed a hug. He enjoyed physical human contact. When I think of him I always see him sitting at a community event or in his chair at the table at Chimo. Kevin would look up and say, "Ohhh. Hi. Jim!". He would take, not shake, my hand and hold it for a while.

He recognized his own vulnerability, his need for assistance from other people. I can't even begin to count the number of times Kevin held my hand or arm as we walked somewhere. I sometimes wondered if Kevin really needed my help but I never hesitated to provide it. I think we both enjoyed that human physical contact. And as I get older, I recognize Kevin's wisdom. More and more I tell myself that I need to ask other people for help with all kinds of things.

By my calculation Kevin, over 39 years, would have lived with close to 100 assistants and was friends with 100s more. He touched their hearts and taught them about friendship, forgiveness and healing, things that will live with them for the rest of their lives.

I have no doubt that Kevin has gone ahead of us on our journey together through this Great Mystery of Life and is with his loved ones in heaven. As Bruce Cockburn says in his song Festival of Friends, "Whatever happens it isn't the end, we'll meet again at the Festival of

Friends." I look forward to seeing him again and have him reach out and hold my hand.

Kevin Manley, a true gentleman, a very compassionate friend and most of all a person with an incredible sense of humour. I can describe my 6 years of living with him in Chimo as the most enriching and colorful years of my adult life. He taught me the value of taking time for people we care for, patience, and the importance of forgiveness and reconciliation.

I came to L'Arche thinking it was my job to take care of people but I was wrong. The core members, especially Kevin, took care of me too. He held me during my lowest moments. I did not need to tell him what I was going through, he just knew and always offered his arms wide open and his shoulder to cry on. I remember him saying "If you cry, I will give you a hug". It was always re-assuring.

I will miss those random hugs. Kevin had a way to make us feel good with his witty jokes, and who would forget his awesome dancing skills. We will cherish all the good times with him, those compliments he always gave to the ladies, the laughter, the chocolate-chip cookies and the regular Subway and McDonalds dates.

Kevin was a dear faithful friend, a comforter to many and a charming gentleman with an undeniable wit.

He would often see me and say "Hey how about a date, how about I take you

out?" Knowing fully well where he wanted to go, I would still ask "So where are we going Kevin?". To which he would proclaim "SUBWAY!!". He was such a regular customer at the Regent Avenue Subway that the ladies would cheerfully greet him as soon as he walked in and ask "Same as usual, Kevin?" never forgetting to add 2 chocolate chip cookies and a bottle of coke - never a fountain drink.

Kevin would help around the house especially around supper time when he would set the table, put away the dishes and place mats, and would sometimes sweep the floor. One day, when apparently there had been too many requests for Kevin, he turned with a cheeky grin and said "What else madam, stand on my head?"

Kevin made the bad days for many much more bearable. In him I found my purpose at L'Arche, what I've spent so many years searching for. Through his vulnerability he taught me how to truly love and how to accept love in return. Kevin often affirmed this by giving long lingering hugs, a kiss on the hand, a thoughtful prayer or simply saying "I love you".

Kevin's intuition was so strong that a few months ago during a quiet time in his room he gently held my hand and said "Kadian, I am going to die" - not with fear but as a matter of fact. That statement caught me off guard but he was persistent until it was acknowledged. He then went on to say "I'll be in heaven. Will you miss me?" Of course my dear and faithful friend, you will be missed. You have left us with many life lessons and stories to share for many years to come. Thank you for having been just you.
