Wishes Granted

S any house owner knows, upkeep of one's property can be quite expensive - especially when it comes to roof replacements. With ownership of six homes, L'Arche Winnipeg's property expenditures are substantial. Securing some grants to help with maintenance costs is essential.

We are very grateful for the Essential Needs Fund (a Richardson Foundation and United Way Partnership) grant of \$15,000.00 which helped us replace the roofs of Dayspring in Transcona and The Anchor in Norwood. A grant from MREA Foundation also helped us to replace the roof at Elpida in Windsor Park.

We are equally grateful for grants that help our social enterprise, L'Arche Tova Café, continue to thrive and to live out its mission. A Richardson Foundation grant of \$9,950.00 helped the Café replace two fridges this year. We received a federal grant administered by **The United Way of Winnipeg** (\$20,000.00) for wage support of staff at the Café, and this was especially helpful given the closure, and subsequent limitations imposed on the Café due to the spread of the corona virus.

Highlights of the Year 2020

January

◆ Sister Sue Mosteller C.S.J. from Toronto is named an Officer of the Order of Canada "for her dedication to improving the lives of people with intellectual disabilities and for her decades of work as a leader of L'Arche". ◆ We mourn the death of Michele Roy, member of L'Arche Winnipeg since 1984. ◆ L'Arche Tova Café upgrades it's Point of Sale (POS) system.

February

♦ A sold-out Music Night at L'Arche Tova Café ♦ Day-long workshop Building Respectful Workplaces for all L'Arche office personnel ♦ Launch of our annual May Walk with L'Arche ♦ Our community Lenten Retreat at the end of February ends up being the last time we can gather as a whole community in 2020. March

 ♦ L'Arche Winnipeg is one of several presenters at the diocesan Social Justice Conference held at St. Boniface Cathedral ♦ Funding Innovation \$1,116.04 cheque presented to L'Arche for sale of artwork through the *Easel program* ♦ COVID-19 shutdown in mid-March puts an end to our large community gatherings and visits to our homes. ♦ The Coordinating Team develops a Pandemic Preparedness Plan ♦ L'Arche Tova Café closes indefinitely due to the pandemic.

April

♦ A decision is made to proceed with a virtual Walk for L'Arche, extending the pledge drive by one month ♦ Purchasing Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) - masks, gloves, sanitizer - proves to be challenging, with suppliers selling out quickly ♦ Zoom quickly becomes the platform of choice for connecting with each other, for meetings, L'Arche Nights, Prayer Nights, and to help alleviate the isolation of our members ♦ Wi-Fi service is upgraded in the homes, and tablets are bought for each house, to help keep people connected.

May

◆ United Way of Winnipeg grant from the Richardson Foundation Inc. in the amount of \$9,950.00 allows L'Arche Tova Café to purchase two new fridges ◆ Walk with L'Arche is a virtual event ◆ Many core members participate in a socially distanced (in their own homes) week-long "Retreat in a Box" offered by Hope Centre Ministries.

June

◆ L'Arche Tova Café re-opens with restrictions ◆ Roof replacements at 3 of our houses made possible with grants from MREA and Essential Needs Fund ◆ The annual assistants' retreat, becomes an Agape Meal picnic & visit, as we met in several small groups in parks throughout the city.

July/August

 ♦ Canada Day, birthdays, and other events are "bubble-celebrated" with social distancing ♦ Walk with L'Arche prizes are drawn, and earned gift cards mailed out

- Because of a limited number of participants, L'Arche Tova Café only has 2
- Thursday dates for selling baked goods at the Transcona Biz Market Garden.

September

♦ L'Arche Winnipeg Annual General Meeting on ZOOM ♦ A Social Media Coordinator is designated for L'Arche Winnipeg.

October / November

♦ New Code Red restrictions in Winnipeg are strictly adhered to by L'Arche Winnipeg as we strive to remain virus-free and protect our vulnerable and aging members ♦ L'Arche Nights, Prayer Nights, Formation Sessions and other meetings continue to happen on Zoom ♦ More public events are cancelled ♦ Annual Christmas Appeal letter & Gratitude Newsletter are mailed out in November.

December

♦ Our annual Christmas Nativity is an in-house event only ♦ A short video "**Silent Night**", sung in different languages by L'Arche assistants, to be posted on YouTube and the L'Arche Winnipeg website.

When the Covid lockdown arrived in March I, like everyone else, was afraid. What would Covid do to the members of L'Arche Winnipeg, my family and friends? Would some of them get sick and possibly even die? Would our hospitals be able to give them the care they needed? At times it seemed this fear was testing and even shattering my faith.

From Fear to Trust

Winnipeg kept going. Some of our staff in the office were able to work from home but I found that it was important to be in the office to support everyone. Core members were asked to stay home from their day programs and we stopped having visitors to our homes. Assistants stayed home with them and only went out for essential shopping. Suddenly, there were no customers at the L'Arche Tova Café and we decided we would have to shut it down.

As time passed the government started sending us memos outlining that staff in our homes must wear masks and eye protection, and no visitors were allowed. They started supplying us with PPE. Eventually, as case numbers dropped in Manitoba, our core members were allowed to meet family and friends outside in the back yard of their home, with physical distancing. Later they were allowed to go to their families' homes.

The café reopened in June with 50% capacity, physical distancing, and enhanced cleaning. We were really encouraged by the number of customers who showed up again. In July, I estimated that we had about 2/3 of our usual customer count!

As time went on I was reminded that for much of my life, I had been delusional. I thought I had much more control over my life than I actually do have. Covid had forced me to realize once again that I needed to rely on the guidance of the Spirit of God. I spent more time in prayer and contemplation. I know from experience that the love of God is present throughout Creation. And I found evidence of that love all around me. In May, we were amazed when our Virtual Walk with L'Arche made as much money as last year. Our many friends and supporters continued to believe in the members of L'Arche Winnipeg and in our mission. On Zoom and in brief outdoor visits, I was often touched by the love and support our assistants were giving to our core members. On my daily walks, people stopped looking so afraid and would often smile and say hello. I am also very thankful that, throughout nine months of this pandemic, no members of L'Arche Winnipeg have contracted this virus.

In July, my first grandchild, Hannah, was born and brought out the love of God through her mother and father and grandparents. For some reason, I started singing to her a blessing song. "Go now in peace." Even as a newborn, I was convinced that she was listening intently to the song and somehow knew that I was blessing her. Since then I have been using that song as a blessing for the many people that I pray for.

As Christmas approaches, I would like to bless all our members, friends and supporters through these words. "Go now in peace. Go now in peace. May the love of God surround you. Everywhere, everywhere, you may go."
