Petra also remarks that "through his dedication to work, Michael expressed immense gratitude for creating a life in which he feels valued and his voice heard. Retirement is a great accomplishment for him."

L'Arche Winnipeg Prepares to Celebrate Its Big 50

The year 2023 will be a remarkable one for L'Arche Winnipeg. We will celebrate 50 years of serving and advocating for people with intellectual disabilities. Over the next year, we will incorporate our 50th-anniversary celebration into our traditional events and host other special events. We will share stories, reconnect with friends we made along the journey, and celebrate half a century with a dinner & dance party.

The history of L'Arche Winnipeg up to the present day has an abundance of dedication, resilience, faith, providence, and advocating stories from people who believed in a better world.

In 1973, Sister Marie Paradis answered the call to create a L'Arche community in Manitoba and opened up the first L'Arche house. L'Aîné (French word meaning eldest, firstborn) was donated to L'Arche by the Oblate Sisters in a great act of generosity and marking the beginning of our community.

Some of L'Arche Winnipeg's pioneers are still with us. We will hear stories from them at a story-sharing gathering next year in August at the Blessed Sacrament Church – where

our story began. The story-sharing event will be a hybrid one, welcoming friends and members who live near and far. A dinner & dance event will happen a few days later. Our Walk with L'Arche fundraiser event will resume inperson after three years of virtual events.

We plan to have a bigger and better event to celebrate our 50th anniversary. The 19th Vickar Automotive Group Walk with L'Arche will welcome members, friends, and supporters on May 6, 2023, at the Oxford Heights Community Club. We will walk and gather for a fun-filled party with music, dance, food, and prizes.

Also, in 2023, we will launch our new website – modern, easy to navigate, and accessible; a website that will better reflect our vibrant community. Our social media channels will share stories of our community throughout the year that will inspire you. Please check our website, Facebook, and Instagram to stay up-to-date.

The past 49 years have been intense and challenging at times, especially the last two years. But every step of this journey has also been fulfilling and rewarding.

Nurturing a Grateful Heart

s the cup half empty or half full? You may say that it depends on the day or the year.

Looking forward to Christmas is like looking at a cup and saying that it is half full. We look around us and reflect on the gifts and the fullness of our lives.

Can we do this authentically? Can we do this even when the cup looks half empty?

We have seen significant changes in the last few years, and it's an understatement to say that life hasn't been easy. Like many other people during the pandemic, our community has suffered the loss of loved ones.

How can we truly enter into the spirit of Christmas in the face of loss? All we can do is hold close the memories of our dear friends.

I think of an experience I had with our dear member with a developmental disability, Sandra, who died a few years before the pandemic. When I came to The Ark as an assistant, I didn't know Sandra very well. One day we went for a walk after supper. Sandra and I noticed all the barking dogs on the block and had fun barking back at them together. When I was about to leave, she quietly said, "I love you." I was surprised by how freely she offered those words to me, and I felt undeserving of them. When she declined in health, I spent several months caring for her in the hospital. Occasionally she would say, "I love you." Her words echoed in my heart. I was touched deeply and, over time, was able to respond with, "I love you too, Sandra."

After her death, I felt great sadness, and treasured the memory of her open heart even more. Her example taught me to say "I love you" more easily.

I learned that life is too short to hold back our love and care from one another, even if giving that love means we will suffer.

Henri Nouwen writes,

"Every time we make the decision to love someone, we open ourselves to great suffering, because those we most love cause us not only great joy but also great pain. The greatest pain comes from leaving ... the pain of the leaving can tear us apart.

Still, if we want to avoid the suffering of leaving, we will never experience the joy of loving. And love is stronger than fear, life stronger than death, hope stronger than despair. We have to trust that the risk of loving is always worth taking."

(Bread for the Journey, Henri Nouwen).

Nouwen reminds us that loving someone inevitably leads to losing them, which causes much grief. There is no way to take away this pain. There is no way to change it. Our hearts may hurt too much for a long time.

Though there is no fix for this kind of pain, perhaps (if we can give ourselves permission), we might consider exploring gratitude. Lisa Irish writes that nurturing a sense of gratitude can open us up slowly and gently to the world around us "offer[ing] soothing relief for our hearts." (Grieving with a grateful heart, Lisa Irish)

As a community that feels the pain of loss, let us pray that the sacred gifts of love and gratitude reach across the chasm of these pandemic years and reconnect our hearts - so that we may freely say to the ones we have lost and to each other: "Thank you for being you. I love you."
