→ 023 has been a very special. year for L'Arche Winnipeg. Not only has it been our first year fully returning to in-person gatherings since the start of the pandemic, but it also marks our 50th Anniversary community. Celebrations spanned the year with our Walk with L'Arche event and 50th Anniversary merchandise sale. but centred around 2 events in August: a thanksgiving service with Blessed Sacrament Parish, and Gala Dinner at Canadinns Event Centre.

Celebrating with Blessed Sacrament Parish brought us back to our beginning - our spiritual roots,

and our relationship with the parish and Oblate Sisters who were so instrumental in the early years of L'Arche Winnipeg's story. Through a beautiful evening of song and reflection, our community held up the cornerstone values that have always defined our spirituality: Joy, Belonging, Solidarity, Fidelity and Unconditional Love.

The Radical Gentleness of Nativity

s I waited at the Concert Hall for the #47 bus on my way to work, I noticed a striking contrast between two men who were disembarking from a bus. One guiding person who was а seemed visually impaired, and once off the bus, the guide released the visually impaired person and trudged roughly on ahead without looking back. The follower stepped forward slowly and unsteadily, arms outstretched with palms strikingly facing up such an open gesture for someone who had many reasons to be fearful. His movements were unsure. Thev were also remarkably gentle.

This situation reminds me of other encounters with gentleness in our L'Arche community: a person with a disability softly whispers to themself; someone gently kisses



a hand upon meeting; a woman relaxes by splashing water in the sink; friends tenderly hold hands; a person's quiet bedtime routine soothes them to sleep; a contented smile connects people from across a room.

These gentle acts are not to be sweetness confused with cuteness; they come from a place of profound tenderness deep within. A person's gentleness may emerge from an experience of vulnerability, but gentleness also comes from a person's choice (at whatever level) to be loving and kind. In many cases, someone's gentleness reflects their choice to hold experiences of pain with tenderness. The effects gentleness are not insignificant gentleness touches hearts and moves people into relationship.

Experiences of gentleness can open hearts to а more compassionate way of being in another's world. Seeing the gentle reverence invites us to greater communion with each with God. while other and choosing gentleness leads us to faithfully walk the peace. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus declares "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth." God comes to us in the meek form of a fragile baby - a baby who radically changes the world.

With the coming of Jesus, Mary sings of the status quo disrupted and the world order turned upside -down. From the mouths of angels and shepherds, the news

of Jesus' birth goes viral. The powers that be (King Herod) are disturbed upon hearing that a new king is born. Throughout his life, Jesus continues to privilege gentleness over aggression even while radically challenging oppression and exposing injustice.

first came to L'Arche three

years ago seeking more life-giving work – I had always had a heart for people and thrived in my past community experiences, but my studies and employment at the time were not filling me with the life that I knew was possible.

My sister had meaningful and healing experiences living in L'Arche as an assistant, and suggested I join the community. I began working respite, and while Covid-19 was a large part of my first L'Arche experiences, I felt so blessed to have work that presented opportunities to build relationships with a diverse group of people.

I applied to be a live-in assistant when a room opened up at Elpida - an all-women's home, in which I had made strong connections while working respite. This was my first time moving out of my childhood home and away from my family, so it was a great gift to find family in my new home Elpida!

Navigating relationships with people of diverse ages, backgrounds, and abilities while living in close quarters during the pandemic was challenging, but the vulnerable ways we learned, grew, and loved one another changed life. The core members mν brought us together, feeding my

spirit in a time when life seemed rather empty. It was the little things that brought me so much joy – walks, crafts, spontaneous movie nights, birthdays and celebratory times when we all dressed to the nines even though we couldn't go out.



Elpida's core members - LeeAnn, Gina, Barb, and Stacey, helped me to feel awe and wonder at life's ordinary things in a fresh way. The pure joy that they showed just in our being together was contagious.

This is what I have always appreciated about L'Arche - the act of simply "Beina With." practical Although we have routines of banking, shopping, cooking and cleaning, it is being present to each other that creates connection, joy and a kind of love that both gives and receives. I built wonderful connections as we shared stories from diverse past experiences, were vulnerable with each other, laughed and cried together, and got creative with house activities. I learned many new things from my fellow live-in assistants and they provided me with a window into perspectives different from my own.

My time as a live-in assistant brought me eight new non-biological sisters who I carry with

me through life's changes. I am now a live-out assistant at Elpida, and although life and staff are always changing, Elpida's ladies continue to teach me to be more present and find joy in the little things. As L'Arche Winnipeg moves forward into the future, the "being with" one another will always be something that will help us be more attentive to each other, and help us grow in loving and being loved in the present moment, wherever that finds us.
