L'Arche Winnipeg was one of ten organizations that was chosen to receive a star blanket from LITE. LITE (Local Investment Toward Employment) is an organization that promotes community economic development by supporting inner-city initiatives in Winnipeg that build capacity and provide jobs.

The Star Blanket is an excellent example of LITE's support of community development. Each year LITE purchases beautiful Star Blankets from local Aboriginal Co-operatives and businesses to donate the blankets to non-profit organizations for use in their fundraising activities.



The Star Blankets purchased were from Cree-Ations and Northern Star Worker Co-op. The Star Blankets create employment for the people who make them and are given to organizations that are providing job training and employment for those people who face barriers to employment.

L'Arche Winnipeg is very grateful that our organization was chosen to receive one of the Star Blankets. These blankets are beautifully made and show the true talent and artistry of the individuals that have created them.

The Star Blanket, created by Cree-Ations will be one of the prizes which will be given away at the 2015 Walk with L'Arche. This beautiful blanket retails for \$550.00.

In remembrance of Nicole, here is a story - a lesson - she once taught me.

Some years ago, when L'Arche was hosting at Sunday mass, Nicole was one of the people helping to take up the collection. Having gone up one aisle and down the other, she then noticed someone had been missed. So she went all the way up to the front, past the alter, right up to the priest and tended the collection basket to him...

He smiled, and found a few coins in his pocket to deposit in the basket. Many people in the church were smiling, and as I reflected on this after, I thought: who would dare do what Nicole did, go tend the collection basket to the priest? Most of us would be far too concerned with thoughts such as: what would I look like, what would people think of me? We can easily live closed up in a certain "prison" without even being aware of it, the prison of "image", the worry of what people might think of us.

Nicole did not live in that "prison", she taught me that it was OK to just be who you are, do what you have to do, and don't be so preoccupied or fearful of what other people might think of you. She had the freedom to simply be herself, no excuses needed.

Oh, and she also taught me the importance of being attentive to everyone, and not forget a single person!

Remembering Nicole

od called Nicole to be a member of L'Arche Winnipeg on November 8th, 1977, over 37 years ago. Initially, Nicole lived at the L'Arche Farm near Lorette but it soon was apparent that farming was not her thing and she moved to Rosseau Court (now known as L'Ainé) in August of 1978, where she lived for over 36 years. Nicole was not someone who liked change, and so she had the same home for the rest of her life on this earth.

Nicole possessed many gifts. She had a gift of welcome. When someone came to L'Ainé, Nicole would join Rick and Ross in welcoming the visitor into her home. She would always ask me how my wife and daughters were doing and then would usually ask about her friends in the office. Nicole had a lovely smile, which was shy and humble but very engaging at the same time. It was impossible not to smile back.

Nicole was a very good friend. The most important thing in her life was people. She deeply loved her family and friends. As Joy said to me, she held up her end of the friendship. She would be persistent in keeping in touch and getting together with her family and friends. And she was always concerned about how they were doing.

She had a very good sense of humour. She liked to tease and be teased. If she happened to see me before a community event, she would always tell me with a twinkle in her eye that she wasn't going to attend it. I would say that we really wanted her to be there, but it was her decision. Invariably she would show up, I am sure, to see all her friends.

Nicole had an amazing gift of intuition. She knew that Joy was pregnant before Joy did. She could tell when her friends were struggling with something. This intuition, I am sure helped Nicole to be aware of God the Creator's presence in the world. She knew that God loved her as she was.

And she loved us as we are. She was a very forgiving person who, while sometimes annoyed with us, never held a grudge. Surprisingly, my fondest memory of Nicole was spending 24 hours with her in the emergency ward of the Health Science Centre three years ago, as we waited for her to be admitted. She had come with Joy the previous day, but by the time I got there she had resigned herself to being there. She teased me, smiled at me and generally was very good company. I felt forgiven for making her be there.

She was a very good teacher, with lots of patience. In her 37 years at L'Arche she would have helped train well over one hundred assistants. Nicole graciously shared her gifts with them all.

We are very grateful to God for bringing Nicole into our lives. She has gone ahead of us on our journey through Creation. But when we catch up to her and we ring the doorbell to heaven, Nicole will be there to welcome us with her lovely smile and a question about how our loved ones are doing.

A Dream Come True - Russell's Trip to Kenya

Joyleen Vanheyst (L'Arche Homes Coordinator) came to L'Arche Winnipeg in 2007, and soon after became Russell's prayer partner ("prayer partners" reflect L'Arche's desire for each member to have a special friend with whom they can meet for prayer, go out for a coffee, and do various other things together).

For seven years, Russell has been praying for Joyleen's family in Kenya, and expressing his desire to go visit her country of origin. Finally, with the help of Russell's brother Martin, Joyleen was able to organize a two week trip to Kenya last October for Russell and herself (Joyleen's fiancé Chris would also join them).

"Russell was so happy, he started waving his Kenyan shirt around. He wanted to know everything about Kenya", Joy recalls about announcing the news to him. "He had two priorities: meet my family, and go on a safari to see zebras and giraffes."

"He was so happy to meet everyone in my family, he fit in right away, even with the cultural differences. He loved being with my mom and my brothers." says Joy. Besides family, they were also able to visit the L'Arche community in Kenya, go to Mombasa (a coastal city), do an ocean excursion and see various fish through a glass-bottom boat. And, of course, there was the 3-day safari where Russell got to see giraffes 10 feet away from their vehicle. Being a man of few words, his descrip-
